

## **SWINDON DEANERY SYNOD**

This has been a year of transition within the Swindon Deanery. Several parish clergy have left and after over 20 years in office Bishop Mike retired in September 2017. To inform the diocese about the background and skills needed in the next bishop a deanery-wide consultation was held and members of our church partnership presented their views. As a result of input a statement of need has been created which can be viewed at:

When the Area Dean Rev. Simon Stevenette stepped down Clive Deverill took up this role. In addition several members of the Deanery Leadership Team stood aside after several years' service with new members serving.

The overall emphasis within the Diocese has been on encouraging growth in some important areas.

- Growing children's and youth work. Dan Jones (Diocesan advisor) has been available to help create a long-term strategy; he has also conducted a review of the work we do within West Swindon and Lydiard Tregoze.
- Links with Uganda and in particular with Luweero Diocese and Kampala. Trips have been organised and our own partnership is supporting a primary school.
- Investing in Growth demands a financial contribution from us all and churches are encouraged to adopt the Parish Giving Scheme.
- Renewal and Reform initiative is country wide and encourages churches to work on new ideas for growth. They provide help and financial support to invest in the numerical and spiritual growth of churches.
- The role of lay people in growing faith within our communities was underlined by Matt Frost a member of the Archbishop's Council. He encouraged all churches to see that lay people and their witness at work, home and leisure is the greatest resource the Church possesses.

The year ahead will be an interesting and challenging one; new church schools are planned and Swindon is still expanding. Synod meetings will reflect this and recognise the need for prayer for changes that lie ahead.

Please continue to value and pray for our young people as part of our church family.

In July our latest cafe raised an all-time-record £72, which we split between our funds and Jacqueline's Bethany Trust walk. We also had fun running a summer party and Christmas bowling outing.

Janet and Connie joined, bringing a much welcomed strengthening of the team; Jude had to step down because of work commitments and we are very grateful to her for many years of cheerful and creative leading. We greatly appreciate new features of services: the children's 'Show and Tell' when they return for communion and the extra input that has gone into running lively Family Services.

We found it inspiring and humbling to draw up a list of children past and present who have come through Junior Church; we reflected on the precious opportunities we have, even if short term, to have an input for God in their lives. Each of us thought about our key motivations about working with the children and drew up a Vision Statement 'LIFE' - do have a look at all this information and the children's craft work on our noticeboards in the Stable Room.

Members also contribute sandwiches to the Filling Station for the homeless in Swindon. Under the auspices of the Samaritans Purse we also fill Shoe boxes with gifts for deprived children overseas who might not otherwise receive a Christmas present.

The year ended with an Advent Service led by the Revd Captain Clive Deverell. Following the service mince pies were available.

Although we do not have a large membership our members are generous with their Time and Gifts whenever and wherever they are needed.

For the first time, I have written as your only stipendiary minister one single report. This report for all our Churches will seem strange to some.

This report gives you a snapshot of what it means to belong to the community of your Church and fellowship. Think of the many different ways in which we engage with one another and the wider community, as we seek to live out our faith in Christ Jesus. Some of which I have been part of, others not.

I hope that this report provokes you to think more widely. I ask that because I am having to broaden my own outlook. For many of you, 2017 has been difficult, with illness and bereavements taking a heavy toll in our Partnership Churches.

Yet as I reflect on events that have occurred since I arrived over seven years ago, I see that a massive amount of transformation has taken place across the partnership. To my mind, the people of God have been set free to use their gifts. Every member Ministry through mutuality through and in our Baptism.

So my thanks to our Wardens, Steve, Sue, Doreen, Jacqueline and Pat, our stewards and senior leaders, including Chris. You have enabled me to continue to take wider roles. My thanks to those in formal roles: Mary, Jan, Trevor, Claire, Gayle, Rachel, Ian, David and Brenda.

At the beginning of February 2018, the formal separation of Lydiard Millicent from the parish and Partnership will take place. It is a time of sadness for us all. Mark Dowling, when appointed Partnership Chair, agreed to see us through to this eventuality (the separation), with all its pain and heartache. He has done so and now he has stepped down. In this report to each Church I can record my own personal thanks to him for his leadership and wisdom.

Our challenge will be to read this report and reflect how many others helped deliver each event and activity, in our own context and more widely. God is moving; vocations are growing, so from litter picking to Emerge, ask how can we join in and expand what we are doing, as we join in God's Mission.

## **PASTORAL CARE GROUP**

The main part of the meeting is when each pastoral friend shares with the group any concerns or contacts they have had with those on the family / membership list.

There is a list in the stable room on the noticeboard of who the pastoral friends are for St Mary's. Any one of them can be contacted by members of the congregation if you would like support, prayer, to ask questions about the church, or to find out who is your pastoral friend. If you would prefer a different member of the group to offer support then please let us know and you can be allocated your preferred person.

All members of the team have been issued a certificate from the 'Disclosure and Barring Authority', to work with vulnerable adults. They are all aware of the guidance around confidentiality and the need to abide by the information given by the Diocese in the 'Policy for Vulnerable Adults'. Further pastoral training this year did not take place, due to a number of factors. (Arrangements for 2018 will be explored to perhaps provide joint training with the other pastoral teams within the partnership).

The pastoral friends would like to take this opportunity to thank all members of the congregation for their support. We would urge all those in the congregation to help the pastoral team to extend a warm welcome and fellowship to newcomers and visitors to St. Mary's, so we can continue to live up to our mission statement of being a 'living, loving, worshipping community in an historic building'.

## **BELL RINGERS GUILD**

### **Gloucester and Bristol Diocesan Association of Church Bellringers**

St Mary's tower is a member of the Swindon Branch of the Gloucester and Bristol Diocesan Association of Church Bellringers. St Mary's hosts ringing for the Swindon Branch on an annual basis.

### **Peals and Quarter Peals**

One full peal and a total of 15 quarter peals were rung through the past year. The majority of the quarter peals were rung on the third Sunday of the month by our local band but we have also had visiting ringers ringing quarter peals including one organised by Julie Miles who aimed to ring quarter peals in every tower in the Swindon Branch in a week in June for the Julie McDonnell Strike back against blood cancer campaign. She scored 18/18 and raised a considerable sum towards the cause.

### **Weddings**

During 2017, we rang for 11 weddings. Ringing for weddings and blessings is one of the few ways to earn money to invest in Tower maintenance, and is an important source of income for us. This year, we ordered a set of new ropes in January and delivered in October at a cost of just over £1000. that's an awful lot of weddings we have to ring!

### **Visiting ringers**

We had 4 sets of visitors in 2017. Visiting ringers traditionally make a small donation which helps towards our Tower funds.

## **ASSOCIATE MINISTER'S REPORT**

### ***"There is only one Lord Jesus Christ"***

Two years ago, I wrote about my initial journey from my curacy at Highworth, Blunsdon, etc [2012-2015] towards our West Swindon Partnership [2015 – present]

Last year my annual reflection was about our pastoral work in the partnership.

The last 12 months have been more of the same, yet my journey [all our journeys] continue; following God's calling. If there is one thing I'm adamant about, and the reason I felt so drawn to our Partnership, is that it is not of any particular denomination. It encompasses several denominations, and although I'm formally licensed through the Church of England, I'm here as a Christian to serve as God wills.

I know these may sound like glib or easy words to say, but as I indicated two years ago, it is ecumenical or partnership ministry to which, I believe we are called. It's good that we each have different feelings about how we are called, what we believe, what gifts God has given us to use and how we use them. It's the differences that colour and enrich our ministry together.

The following is just a summary of some 2017 activities:

During 2017, I had an opportunity to step out of my comfort zone [relatively speaking] and help to service some of the Methodist Church communities across and around the North Thames District [of which we are also part] ... which has included Evening Prayer and Holy Communion at Highworth, Shrivenham, Cricklade, Braydon, to name but a few. How did I feel? Challenged [Yes!] ... yet it was amazing ... enriching ... building new relationships/fellowship ... meeting old friends.

During the early Summer of 2017 I was asked to help for 3 months with 'Exploring Christianity' at Lydiard Millicent, while Tudor was on sabbatical ... I mentioned our journeys and I'm pleased to say that several of those attending the course, have started to consider next steps on their own faith journeys and vocations in ministry ... these might include Lay and Ordained Ministry in both/either Anglican and Methodist churches.

November's Remembrance was a key focus for the year, with our maintaining services [11am and 2pm each day] in the Royal British Legion Walled Garden of Remembrance [Lydiard Park] from the formal opening on 10<sup>th</sup> November to the formal closing at 3pm on the 19<sup>th</sup> November.

This year [2018] will be more special perhaps, because it is 100 years since the end of WWI. It will be a privilege to continue our work with the RBL in this respect and for Remembrance across the town.

I think, if there is one aspect of our ministry that is up there with most; it is that of being able to share Holy Communion in the homes of those, who are house-bound. For me, it is part of really, where church is; not just in our 'church buildings' but where-ever we meet people.

Our Christmas services had mixed attendance at the different events due to inclement weather, the most affected service was our Christingle. Christingles were able to be distributed to other events in the partnership. The evening of the Crib Service the church was full, with many families attending. We need more sheep this year (2018) so request any knitters for assistance!

The restoration project of the church is ongoing. ## **TREASURER'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31 DECEMBER 2017**

The general fund this year had a slight decrease of £1,018. The fund is now at £12,648.

The total general fund income this year was down a bit again and this time it was giving and no flower festival that produced the reduction, ministry fees were up a little bit to £3,900. Planned giving increases from those that were able to, did nearly make up for the reductions from those who had left us.

With expenditure, we weren't able to give the amount we had hoped to give to the Partnership but did give the same as last year (£36,000). There was slightly more building maintenance needed this year so as to get the building electrically safe and the building fund helped out with some of these costs. Other expenditure was again pretty much in line with my fairly tough budget. The amount given in missionary and charitable giving was £5,000 in tithes, £1,300 from Christmas collections and £120 to the Manchester appeal.

We have £4,939 in the general fund which has been given for the sound system.

The building fund had income of £79,925 and expenditure of £104,952. The building fund is now at £16,701. But this is just the year end figure, some of the pledged money comes in as it is needed. Looking forward to 2018 the budget has been set at a similar level to this year, however this will result in reserves being used if we don't get additional income.

## **BUILDING REPORT**

Following the award in December 2016, when St Mary's church was successful with the application to the Heritage Lottery Fund, the Development Phase has progressed on timetable throughout 2017, with the appointment of all the consultants including that of Conservator Jane Rutherford and her team to undertake conservation of the medieval wall paintings and monuments. All necessary surveys and reports required have been undertaken. In October 2017, Jane & her team undertook a detailed survey of the wall paintings, polychromy and monuments.

At the beginning of 2017 Marys still needed to raise £155,000 to complete the funding of the Delivery Phase. Fund raising has continued throughout 2017 with grant awards from Garfield Weston Foundation, All Churches Trust, The Leche Trust, Wiltshire Historic Churches Trust, The Alan Evans Trust, St Andrews Conservation Trust and continued public fund raising. The balance to raise now stands at £75,500. In the spring of 2018 St Marys will be applying to the Heritage Lottery Fund for the Delivery Stage grant of £615,000. The scheme will restore St Mary's historic interiors and make it more accessible to the public with access improvements, imaginative interpretation and lively education programmes, and will include a new heating and lighting system.

Throughout the summer, Volunteers from Nationwide & The Arval Group supported the Corporate Volunteer Programme of the Conservation Project. Work has included clearing and preparing a new wild flower bed and other works in the grounds, and painting St Mary's railings and gate.

The main focus of the Delivery Phase is the conservation of the extensive medieval wall paintings, identified by the Church of England as one of the 100 artworks currently most in need of conservation in their **100 Church Treasures Appeal**. Rt Reverend Dr Lee Rayfield, Bishop of Swindon said "We are delighted that the Heritage Lottery Fund has given us this support. St Marys is a national treasure and preserving its unique features will benefit both local and the nation's heritage"

During 2017 the church has been opened & stewarded on every weekend throughout the year from January to December including public bank holidays. Furthermore, the church was open and stewarded on Fridays from April to the early November by Arts Society volunteers This has resulted in over 8257 visitors to the church from all over the world.
