Safeguarding report 2023 for Holy Trinity Church Shaw Church, Swindon.

We have had no issues with safeguarding this last year.

At the end of 2023 we have talked about the process of moving all of Shaw's safeguarding administration from the partnership of West Swindon and Lydiard Tregoze to Shaw Church.

There has been an ongoing updating of DBS's and training as to when they have become out of date.

We have not had any new recruitments this year, but there is just one in progress.

FINANCIAL REVIEW 2023

2023 was an interesting year, and as always things never come out as expected. Our income was up on what was expected, but so was our outgoings. But in a nutshell we ended up better off than expected, but considerably negative overall, due entirely to the solar panels

However to give the highlights:-

- We have paid for the solar panels (£25859) and we received a loan from the partnership of £15859
- Our booking secretary has been working hard and our commercial rents have increased from £11600 to £17600, although this was in part due to receiving some unpaid back rents of £2156.75
- Planned giving was up slightly thanks to a few new members and their generosity
- Envelopes are down as most people do STO now, plus we have lost people who used to give this way—it is likely this will be nil in 2024
- The increase in Publicity/ Training was mainly down to LLM courses
- We have yet to give our 10% for either 2022 or 2023—previously the charities we had given to were BMS, Filling Station and SYC. It has only just been agreed that these will continue and we have been awaiting account details before paying
- Rubbish disposal seems high but we paid promptly and are slightly ahead of the game
- Cleaning costs were down but this was due to Pre School leaving and us reducing the cleaning from 3 days to 2 days.
- Church rents were up as the Guides/ Brownies / Rainbows have increased their hours from the previous year
- Water was down as historically they had taken estimates which were over pessimistic so at one stage we had a credit balance

Challenges for 2024:-

- 10% giving for 2022 has been made in Jan 2024, 2023 giving will be paid once we have received our funds from Historic churches
- We have no idea how much the solar panels will positively help our electricity costs
- Cleaning charges continue to increase because of the National Living wagehowever it should be noted we have been very pleased with the present cleaners and there have been little to no complaints in 2023 around cleanliness
- Expecting Council charges / BIFFA to increase above inflation rates

- We are expecting the Partnership Council to ask us to repay the loan of £15859 if possible before the Partnership dissolves on the 31st August—this should be possible
- To try and get a balanced balance sheet we will need, if possible, to keep our maintainance costs down to £2k (£6953 in 2023). There have been exceptional items last year such as re doing the lights at £3186. Also we have been very fortunate with Wendy and David, Rebecca and Bob doing work either for free or at greatly reduced cost to us.
- By **FAR** the biggest possible change next year would be if we lost PSDA as a rental—they are looking at the possibility of purchasing their own premises—if this did happen then DRASTIC action would need to be taken, what actions would be down to the Trustees I believe.
- We may look to improve our sound system so to improve worship
- The Church of England may wish to look at us increasing our giving to them personally I do not believe this to be feasible, but we may receive a request

Actions taken:-

- We will review our finances monthly to ensure we can always have funds to pay our bills for a 3 month period.
- Wendy is continuing to look at opportunities to apply for grants
- We continue to maximise our church rentals
- We will look to the membership via requests and gift days to cover any large specific outgoings
- We would always suggest people review their giving within their affordability

Payment of the cost of the solar panels has meant that the previously healthy general fund is now down to as low as we would like - however it was what was expected when the decision was made and is a clear example of us stepping out in faith.

So assuming that we always have enough funds to cover 3 months of our outgoings then I see no reason why we should stop stepping out in faith--but I would not say no to a large donation!!

I have also put the figures in the accounts past Sue Green who is looking at things going forward for the partnership / remaining churches, and if any of you are brave enough to question Sue then

Schools Work, March 2024

Holy Trinity Shaw is linked with Brookfield and Shaw Ridge Primary Schools.

OTB continue to provide regular support and go into Brookfield school to lead assemblies, and more recently at Shaw Ridge School. A huge thank you to Heather and all the volunteers from HTS for their time, energy and commitment.

May 23 Children from Brookfield school foundation year came to HTS for a session on "church as a special place." We talked about worship, what different things mean to us in the church, and the children moved around stations to draw objects and ask/answer questions.

September 23 Angela led a session in Brookfield school for foundation year on infant baptism.

Late September 23 Angela led harvest festival services for KS1 and KS2 children at Brookfield school. Brookfield school also used our building for their annual Christmas Carol service with parents.

Easter 24 (upcoming) we will be running an Easter Experience at HTS on both 25th, 26th and 27th march to Brookfield, Shaw Ridge, Westlea and Tregoze schools. Children will also be donated an Easter storybook and small Easter egg.

Review comments: Brookfield school leadership and their RE co-ordinator are very open to talks about Christianity and church. Good to continue to grow this relationship. Can we increase our promotion of Messy Church with the school?

Angela: it would be better if I had a helper I could go into school with – it can be difficult going in alone as the schools are understandably short of people to help carry stuff in, set up/pack down. I have found it stressful sometimes, setting up and getting the tech to work etc, in the very tight time frame that I am allocated for assemblies or workshops.
