

“Easter” is not just for Easter-Time ... It’s for life!

Lent, Holy Week and the Easter week-end have passed for this year; yet Easter continues.

Even after the Ascension [Thu-5May’16], Pentecost/Whitsun [Sun-15May’16] and Trinity Sunday [22May’16]; Easter continues for each of us.

Strictly speaking, I know that the time after Trinity is referred to as ‘Ordinary Time’ and goes on until the feast of “Christ the King” towards end-November, just before Advent]; and yes! We don’t formally call that Easter, but throughout our lives we remember, what Jesus did for us at that first Easter-Tide.

We recognise that Jesus suffered a horrible death by crucifixion as a sacrifice for the sins of everyone; past, present and future and we know that he rose again after death. We remember this time when we break bread and drink wine together at our Eucharist or Holy Communion.

We don’t forget Jesus, just because we are now approaching Ordinary Time. It’s not a time to forget. Neither is it a time to relax our faith in Jesus Christ.

Yet, it can be a good time to reflect on how we live as Jesus has commanded us to live. St John reminds us in his Gospel [John 13vv34-35]:

*“A new command I give you: Love one another.
As I have loved you, so you must love one another.
By this everyone will know that you are my disciples,
if you love one another.”*

As many of you know, from my mid-6’s [1957] until my early 60’s, I had been a chorister and these words of Jesus have been set to music as anthems by many composers over the centuries [from the 16thc by Tallis and Shepherd to some of my favourite settings by contemporary writers, Nardone and Aston]. Listening [*really listening*] to the words being can be a useful reminder of what Jesus did for us and what he expects of us.

The week after Easter, my wife [Coby] and I ventured off for a week to Rome, a city, which neither of us had ever visited. *It didn’t need to have been just after Easter, it could have been any time of the year, but the weather was good [70-75° F each day].*

We journeyed there and back by train [via and over-night in Geneva] ... it was a journey full of being surrounded by God's creation. The Thames valley, Wealds of Kent, the flat lands of Western France, to the snow-covered Alps of Switzerland and Italy then down to the ancient city of Rome. We reflected that if we'd flown we would have seen nothing of these wonders.

Our reaction to Rome was that it is a beautiful city and one not to be missed, if ever you get the opportunity; and yes! Coby and I both threw a coin in the Trevi Fountain, so we'll be back!

It is full of ancient history [*well ... fairly ancient*] and almost everywhere you go, there is another church. One thing, that struck me, was, that two of the largest basilicae there [*you may need to check the plural*] were St Peter's [the well known one in The Vatican City] and St Paul's, which is outside the walls of the city of Rome. My feelings are, that this sort of reflects the way that St Paul was with Jesus direct team of Apostles [as it were]. St Peter takes pride of place in the centre, yet St Paul's is outside. But that was what his mission was, to serve those 'outside' the Jewish faith [*the Gentiles*], while Peter was given the Keys to the Kingdom and was a key player in the movement along with the Jews; although they both ended their lives in Rome.

I'm not going to provide a diary of our trip to Rome, except to say, that experiences that we encounter in our lives are all part of our own Easter journeys with Christ.

Strangers we meet [*ie the friends we haven't yet met*] during many and various aspects of our lives, are opportunities to practice Jesus's command to love one another, as He loved us.

So, as we get ready to enter "Ordinary Time" [*it's ok, it's only 22 or so weeks long*] we remember that Easter is not just once a year, but is a gift for all of us now and always.

Christian Aid Collection at Swindon Railway Station

Christian Aid Week this year is 15th to 21st May. My plan is, subject to having enough volunteers, to try and collect during the morning and evening peak periods on each of the weekdays that week (Monday 16th to Friday 20th). The times that I have suggested to the Station Manager are 7am to 9.30am and 5pm to 7.30pm. A matter of life and death

I read in the paper recently that 2015 was a bumper year for deaths and that life expectancy fell last year for the first time in twenty years. The Office for National Statistics (ONS) stated this as it sought to explain a 5.6% increase in deaths in England and Wales. The report suggested that there were two primary factors; one was flu with the suggestion that the vaccine administered for that particular flu season was inadequate, and the other factor was death through dementia.

I have no feel for what impact such a story will have on those who read it, though to be flippant undertakers and pension fund managers will not be complaining! We used to say that death was a taboo subject in the so-called developed world. I'm not sure I would call it a taboo, I just think that we don't have a narrative within 'modern Britain' from which we can frame our understanding of death. Consequently, our response seems to be that of bewilderment, anger and confusion for the bereaved, and avoidance tactics for the rest of the population.

People will often say to me things like, "I'm not frightened of dying, I just worry about the way I will die." Nobody I know likes the idea of dying alone, drugged to the eyeballs in a hospital bed somewhere/anywhere. Though we can't quite imagine what dying well might look like, I think, when it comes, we all aspire to die well.

Though I was and remain adamantly against the Assisted Dying Bill that MP's thankfully and forcefully kicked into the long grass last year, I do have questions as to why we keep people whose quality of life is seriously degraded in a way that seems, at times unnecessary. Whether it's fear of litigation on the part of medics or pressure from relatives I have no idea.

The Bible says we are 'fearfully and wonderfully made' (Psalm 139:14), but we were not made to live forever. We age, our bodies age and huge sums of money are invested in cosmetic surgery or working out if we can isolate the gene which ages us so that we might look good all our lives! As a pensioner, I am now told that the secret to longevity is to ensure I walk 10,000 steps every day until I can stagger no more.

Here's my main point. Without a narrative within which we can interpret death, it will always seem scary, bewildering and confusing. It's time to think again.

As I write we are in the season of Easter. For me one of the most moving moments of the Christian year is at the end of the Eucharist in

The Wall of Answered Prayers

£10,000 pledged in just 5 days to see a National Prayer Landmark built

In the first 5 days since a national crowd funding campaign was launched on Sunday (3rd April) to build a prayer landmark in the UK, £10,000 has already been pledged towards the £45,000 target.

The Wall is the vision of Richard Gamble, who 12 years ago carried a cross through Leicestershire.

Richard Gamble is the former Leicester Football Chaplain and International Director of Sports Chaplaincy UK but believes his next task is to build a prayer wall for the nation.

Mr Gamble and a growing team is seeking to construct a Christian symbol, equivalent to the Angel of the North, and a 40 day Kickstarter campaign is attempting to fundraise the initial funds to make this happen.

If the Kickstarter is successful, The Wall will be made up of a million bricks - each brick will represent an answered prayer.

Mr Gamble wants the landmark to be built next to a motorway, so that thousands of people will be able to drive past each day and believe that Jesus is alive and that prayers will be answered.

Speaking about the first £10,000 pledged towards the Kickstarter campaign, **Richard Gamble**, Director of The Wall said:

"When the Kickstarter was launched, it was described to me like the Nation had opened its wallet to get behind this huge step of faith that has been taken. Initially money came in but in the middle of the week, it slowed right down.

However, I'm excited to see the initial £10,000 pledged and hope this is the start of a huge sense of growth to see this project come about.

What has inspired me the most in the last 5 days is the number of people from across the world who have heard about this project and given.

I believe this is going to be big and I'd love anyone who shares my heart to join the journey!"

24-hour Pentecost Prayer

St John's, Whitbourne Avenue, Parks

We are feeling prompted to hold a 24-hour Pentecost Prayer and Worship for Parks and Walcot from **9am on Friday 13th May to 9am on Saturday 14th May**. This has come about mainly due to 'Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done' – A call to prayer request within the week leading up to Pentecost from our Archbishop's Justin and John. We would love to have everyone who has a heart for the Kingdom to come in Parks and Walcot to be a part of this. We believe it's to be all Christians coming together regardless of denomination with one heart – to worship God – Father, Son and Holy Spirit and to pray 'Thy Kingdom come' in this community.

"Christ has been raised from the dead: the first fruits of those who sleep. For as by man came death: by man has come also the resurrection of the dead"

The Christian faith has a clear narrative around death. For those who are "in Christ," death is not an end but a new beginning. Life eternal is a gift from God through faith in Christ and not something we earn. Knowing the consequences of death sets us free to live the new life that God wants for us now.

The Church, you and me are meant to be part of evidence of the risen life that Jesus through his Resurrection brings. I sometimes think we need to wake up to this truth. Is it true to say that what I think about death can profoundly impact the way I think about life and how I live it?

HE IS RISEN! HE IS RISEN INDEED! Now that's what I call a narrative!

05 May - Ascension Day

40 Days with the Risen Christ



40 days after Easter comes Ascension Day. These are the 40 days during which the Risen Christ appeared again and again to his disciples, following his death and resurrection.

The Gospels give us little of Christ's teachings and deeds during those forty days. Jesus was seen by numerous disciples: on

the road to Emmaus, by the Sea of Galilee, in houses, etc. He strengthened and encouraged his disciples, and at last opened their eyes to all that the Scriptures had promised about the Messiah. Jesus also told them that as the Father had sent Him, He was now going to send them - to all corners of the earth, as his witnesses.
