



'Mightier than the violent raging of the seas,

Mightier than the breakers on the shore –

The Lord above is mightier than these!' (Psalm 93:4)

These are the words which greet you as you come down to Lee Bay, on the Lee Abbey estate. As we arrived at Lee Abbey for a weekend break in May, Rob and I were feeling somewhat 'tossed about' on the seas of life. Nothing extraordinary, just the usual assortment of family/work/life pressures that most people face at one time or other – or always. Yet, as you step into 'deep time' which Lee Abbey offers all who go there, you realise afresh that you are unique and that God loves you uniquely in all your struggles; you are known and cherished as a son or a daughter of the Living God, in the same way that human parents love and cherish their children individually, except much more so. How amazing is that?!

Through the teaching on prayer, we were reminded that in the Lord's prayer we are told by Jesus to pray 'to the Father' because God wants us to have a relationship with him as his children. That would have seemed truly astonishing and liberating when Jesus taught this; it still is today. It was acknowledged that for those of us who have not experienced good fathering, the fatherhood of God can prove extremely problematic in developing relationship with God. Our God is three-in-one: Father, Son and Holy Spirit and we cannot relate to one or two parts without the other if we want to build a strong, living Christian faith. Somehow, the negative image of fatherhood which we may have in-built from the past needs to be restored and healed (not air-brushed) by someone who knows and has the power to do that. Jesus, the healer, is that person. It can take a lot of courage and determination to do this 'inner work' but, believe me, it is truly worth it. I would recommend Harnhill Centre for Christian Healing, near Cirencester. www.harnhill.centre.org.uk as a place to start (ask me if you want more information).

As Rob and I left Lee Abbey, we realised that we felt refreshed and restored, clean inside and ready to face the difficulties – some of which wouldn't be resolved easily – with the grace and power of the Holy Spirit

19 June - Father's Day

This celebration's history began at the beginning of the 20th century in Spokane, Washington, USA. In 1909, Sonora Smart Dodd imagined this Day while listening to a sermon at Mother's Day in the Methodist Church in Spokane. It was a Sunday, and she thought about a holiday honoring her father, William Smart, a Civil War veteran, whose wife died when Sonora was 16 and he had to take care of six children alone.

The next year, on 19 June, 1910, Sonora together with the help of the Spokane Ministerial Association and of the Young Male's Christian Association organized a tribute to fathers by going to church wearing a red rose for a living father or a white rose for a deceased one. Sonora herself travelled through the city in a covered carriage offering gifts to shut-in fathers. This was the first time Father's Day was observed in history.

But it took many years for this holiday to become official. Despite support from Christian organizations, the holiday was satirized as being shallow and commercial. Presidents Woodrow Wilson, Calvin Coolidge and Lyndon Johnson, as well as Senator Margaret Chase Smith intervened in favor of the Father's Day, but it was all futile. Only in 1972, President Nixon's proclamation made it a national holiday. It is celebrated on the third Sunday of June each year.

The Archbishop of Canterbury

finally finds out who his real father was...

In April the Archbishop of Canterbury discovered that his father was not Gavin Welby, as he had always believed. Instead, DNA testing confirmed that his real father was the late Sir Anthony Montague Browne, a personal aide of Winston Churchill.

In a personal statement Justin Welby spoke of his complete surprise at the news (confirmed by a DNA test following a *Telegraph* investigation) and said his mother has been a wonderful part of his life and continues to be so, praising her determination for overcoming alcohol addiction.

“My own experience is typical of many people. To find that one's father is other than imagined is not unusual. To be the child of families with great difficulties in relationships, with substance abuse or other matters, is far too normal.”

But, the Archbishop went on: “I know that I find who I am in Jesus Christ, not in genetics, and my identity in Him never changes. Even more importantly my role as Archbishop makes me constantly aware of the real and genuine pain and suffering of many around the world, which should be the main focus of our prayers.

“Although there are elements of sadness, and even tragedy in my father's (Gavin Welby's) case, this is a story of redemption and hope from a place of tumultuous difficulty and near despair in several lives. It is a testimony to the grace and power of Christ to liberate and redeem us, grace and power which is offered to every human being.

“At the very outset of my inauguration service three years ago, Evangeline Kanagasooriam, a young member of the Canterbury Cathedral congregation, said: ‘We greet you in the name of Christ. Who are you, and why do you request entry?’

“To which I responded: ‘I am Justin, a servant of Jesus Christ, and I come as one seeking the grace of God to travel with you in His service together.’

What has changed? Nothing!



individuals, as members of organisations and communities, and as countries. Whether it concerns questions of sovereignty, the free movement of people, or where laws are made and enforced, these are issues that influence and affect our relationships, and as such, our faith has much to share.

The UK has a longstanding relationship with the other nations of Europe. Our churches have well established links with Christian communities and congregations across the continent; these relationships extend to nations that are currently part of the European Union and those that are not. It is not an issue of whether we need and value these relationships, or even whether we belong in Europe, but whether that sense of belonging is best expressed by being part of the European Union.

The real referendum question

The referendum question might therefore be phrased as: "To what extent does the European Union enhance or hinder our ability to love our neighbour and, in doing so, our ability to love God?"

You may like to have that at the back of your mind as you work your way through the more detailed material in this resource, along with these other general questions:

- Who, in this context, is our neighbour? Are we talking about neighbours in our local communities, in the UK, in Europe, or in the wider world?
- It is an important aim to have good relations with all countries, in Europe and elsewhere. Does our membership of the European Union help us with this, or hinder us?
- All political and economic structures are made by humans and therefore flawed. The referendum offers us a choice between political and economic structures where the UK is part of the EU or outside the EU. Which would best enable us to fulfil our Christian duty towards God and our neighbour?

Can the EU, in its current or a reformed state, achieve the ideals we might have for it?

Using this resource

This resource explores some of the key issues in the debate. These may not be the issues which are being covered in the media, but they explore crucial questions about how the UK relates to the EU, now and in the future. There may be other issues, not covered in this resource, which are particularly important to you as Christians in your area, and

Think, Pray, Vote:

EU Referendum resources for churches

Which neighbours are we talking about: those in our local communities, in the UK, in Europe, or in the wider world? Does economic union help our relationship with some nations while hindering others? Does the way the European Union makes laws aid or impede our Christian duty?

Introduction

On 23 June each of us will be asked to answer the question "Should the United Kingdom remain a member of the European Union or leave the European Union?"

Behind the simple challenge of the referendum question there are many others which are not on the ballot paper. The referendum is surrounded by controversy, and because opinions differ, so does the interpretation of facts. This resource does not presume to say which way people should vote. Rather, it explores the issues surrounding a range of aspects of membership of the European Union (EU), and offers different opinions and perspectives. Christians may not agree on how to vote in the referendum, but we can each reflect thoughtfully and prayerfully on the issues involved.

Love your neighbour

As Christians we are called to work, live and pray for a better society. This includes participating in the political processes that shape the lives of our communities, our country and our world. It is our identity as followers of Jesus that will both engage us in the referendum and shape our response. How, then, do we allow our faith to inform our answer to one of the biggest political decisions facing the United Kingdom? The gospel accounts remind us that Jesus said the greatest commandment is to "love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind", while the second is to "love your neighbour as yourself." (Matthew 22:36-40). Jesus reinforces the established Old Testament principle that our relationship with God affects the way we relate to and live with one another. These human relationships are an expression of our relationship with God; the two are intertwined.

But what does this have to do with the European Union, the Schengen Agreement and the single market? The answer is that each of these refers to and directly impacts upon how we relate to each other as

When the Vicar won Wimbledon

"Lawn Tennis," wrote J.B. Priestley, "is a name with the mildest associations. It suggests a companion pastime to croquet, a late-Victorian thing, bright with petticoats and delicately clouded with curates."

So it seemed with the development of Wimbledon's All England Lawn Tennis Club from its beginnings in 1869 as a Croquet Club, at which "Gentlemen are requested not to play in their shirt sleeves when ladies are present." However, with the addition of tennis courts to the grounds, the new game gained ascendancy, and the first Wimbledon Tennis Championships took place in 1877.

It was at the third tournament of 1879 that the Rev J.T. Hartley, vicar of Burneston in Yorkshire, won the All-Comers Gentlemen's Singles out of an entry of 45 competitors at Wimbledon, and repeated the feat the following year.

On the middle Sunday of the tournament, he was obliged to dash back to Yorkshire to deliver his church sermon before returning once again to complete his triumph at the All-England Club.

Never again was a clergyman to win Wimbledon. (Though in their dreams I am sure many clergy have appeared in the final a number of times!)

Many of the early players were highly idiosyncratic. In the 1921 quarter-finals Randolph Lycett was playing Zenzo Shimidzu on one of the hottest days in memory. During the third set, Lycett had to be revived with gin every time he changed ends. In the fifth set, muzzy and staggering, he ordered a bottle of Champagne to be brought out onto the Centre Court, and he consumed the last drop of it as the umpire called, "Shimidzu leads by nine games to eight in the final set." The gallery hardly knew whether to object or sympathise when Lycett dropped his racket, and then on hands and knees crawled round in search of it. To most people's relief, Shimidzu won the match.

Today a Bosnian, Novak Djokovic, as world's Number One, leads a dazzling array of players who - almost universally - see Wimbledon as 'the big W' - that can seemingly make a man or woman immortal.


